

## CHAPTER V

### CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

#### 5.1. Conclusion

Referring to the research question, which are the types of lexical cohesion used in Dr. Seuss Children's book, the writer found out that there are repetition, synonym, antonymy, superordinate, and collocation. In the findings, the writer collected fifty-two passages that contain lexical cohesion in Dr. Seuss's children's book. From fifty-two passages, the writer found the most used lexical cohesion in the three books entitled "*The Cat in the Hat*," "*Green Eggs and Ham*," and "*How the Grinch Stole Christmas!*" is repetition with twenty-three cases. A repetition is the process of repeating a phrase or word in a text to highlight the ideas and theme; it also creates the rhythm of a storyline. In the process of writing a story, there are three types of repetition: anaphora, epistrophe, and epizeuxis. For example, the word **wet** is repeated to give the reader a vivid theme of the rainy season, and by that, the word wet can be classified as anaphoric repetition. (see Appendices No. 1).

From this analysis, the writer has also found other kinds of lexical cohesion mostly used after repetition, it is synonym with thirteen cases. Synonymy is a word that have a similar meaning as another word. Synonymy has two types: absolute and partial synonym. For example, the word **looked** and **saw** classified as synonymy because both words have the similar meaning which is the act of observing something by eyes and both of these words knows as partial synonym. #### 5.2. Suggestion

After the writer finished the research, the writer also found another finding. There are words from the text that can be analyze more than just the lexical cohesion. To start with, the future writer can do research about the grammatical lexical and its type. Besides that, the future research can explore the writing styles of Dr. Seuss used for his books. Unlike this research, only focuses on the lexical cohesion and its types.

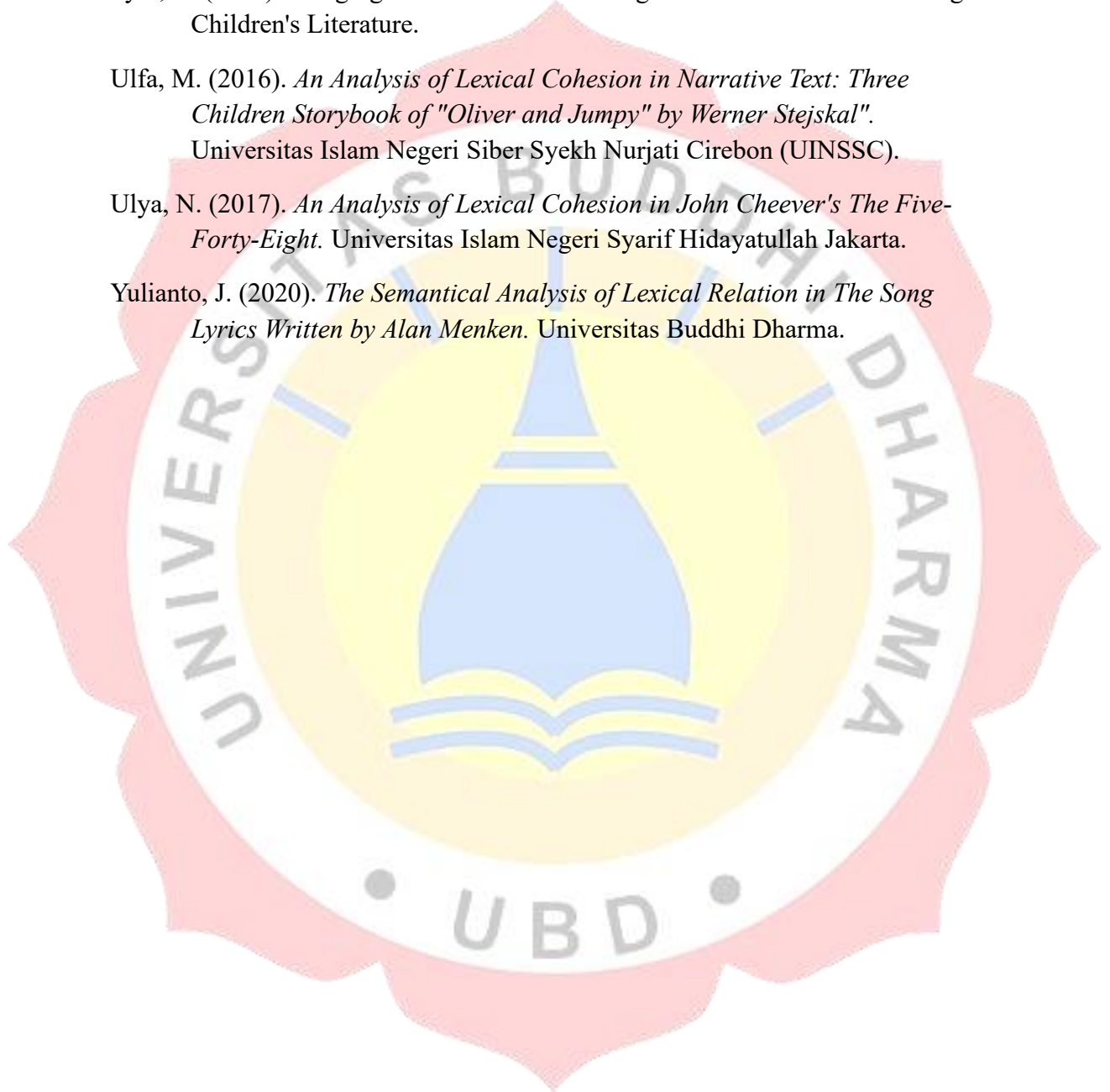
