

## CHAPTER V

### CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

#### 5.1 Conclusion

To sum up the analysis of the first research question, the researcher present results related to shadow and persona as follows, started with the results concerns about the shadow cast by Napoleon. Napoleon's shadow is a product of his intense desire to be a dictatorial leader who governs autonomously. While striving for this goal, researcher reveals numerous darker aspects of Napoleon personality that could be viewed as unethical. Napoleon's aspiration for power, control, and superiority over other animals is evident in his pursuit to reinforce his authority by positioning himself as the single leader and restricting the animals' freedom to voice their opinions, leaving no space for doubt in his leadership. He is cunning and deceiving, manipulating the animals on the farm through controlling the narrative, like slandering Snowball, altering the commandments, and getting rid of the *Beast of England* without their approval. Snowball's advancement and innovative ideas trigger envy and insecurity in Napoleon, forcing him to display contempt and mockery towards Snowball's accomplishments. Napoleon was hypocritical towards the farm's idealism of avoiding interactions with humans by making agreements with humans as an excuse for the farm's welfare. He resorted to violence and brutal acts to achieve specific goals. He claimed credit for all of the farm's accomplishments, including the windmill, demonstrating his greed.

In addition to those results, this research also pertains to the persona displayed by Napoleon. Napoleon's image was a creation by either Napoleon


himself or implemented by Squealer to present him as a genuine leader, despite actually being a facade to conceal his true motives. Some animals who may believe in him always offer the support he desires, leading to blind faith. Napoleon has often been depicted as intelligent, brilliant, and visionary, as evidenced by his ability to spin ideas, though this serves as a cover-up for his lack of innovation on the farm. His persona as “Napoleon always right” enhances his leadership role by ensuring animals see him as infallible. His acts of benevolence, care, and responsibility shape his persona as a leader who protects the animals, even though this is only a maneuver to attract sympathy.

The second result of this research is related to the second research question, which is the impact of Napoleon’s shadow and persona on Animal Farm plot lines. Napoleon's shadow and persona play a crucial role throughout Animal Farm, manipulating the animals and ultimately leading them down a path of corruption. First, the divided idealism of the animals. Left them vulnerable to being controlled. Then, the animals lost their freedom because of harsh condition that forced them to obey any unwanted rules. Lastly, the history of the farm has been distorted due to manipulation of past events, or the idealism of the farm has been tarnished.

## **5.2 Suggestion**

The researcher has several suggestions for further research related to the topic being discussed, namely the concept of Jungian *shadow* and *persona*, where this concept is very possible if applied to various other forms of literary works such as films, short stories, poetry, and so on. Then the *Animal Farm* novel itself can be studied in various possible aspects, not only from the psychoanalytic lens as carried

out by researchers, but can also explore other approaches, such as social and political approaches, or by internally examine the novel itself structurally. Nevertheless, the researcher acknowledges that there is potential gap for further development of the Jungian archetype concept by incorporating additional concepts such as anima/animus and the self, which have not been addressed in this study. An opportunity for future research to potentially address. Researchers have great hopes for this study since it will assist readers in obtaining the information they need as well as serve as an additional reference, particularly for parties such as students and other researchers studying literature.


